RACE RESULTS

19 December, Criteriums, Kewdale

The forecast was for windy conditions and it wasn't wrong, but rather than dampen activity it seemed to stir up the 96 riders in the various fields into attacking mode. 'A' grade witnessed probably the hardest event of the series to date with an attack moving off the front on the first lap when a strong group comprising Doug Stewart, Sam Smith, Julian Lowes, Chris Glasby, John Gregg, Roy Gillespie, Wade Keyser and the omnipresent Ian Lyne rode away to what looked like an unbeatable lead of over the length of the finishing straight. After about 25 minutes, however, Eddy Hollands, Greg Stoyles and Andrew Brierley pulled away from the main peloton and gradually brought back the escapees to catch them at the 30-minute mark, only for Sam Smith and Chris Glasby to open up another gap, though this was short-lived. Ian Lyne suffered a fall but was allowed back in after a lap out and in the final laps was in no-man's land where he was later joined by Greg Stoyles. Meanwhile Sam Smith and Chris Glasby increased their lead over the bunch to 35 seconds, to finish in that order with Greg Stoyles in third, Ian Lyne 4th and Roy Gillespie and Fenton Moran leading in a stretched crocodile of riders in the 26-strong field.

'B' grade also got off to a flying start when Geoff Marshall and Ian Turner put down the hammer, though they were soon brought back, which led to a few fresh but short-lived attacks. Riding at a fast pace there was little chance of a winning gap appearing, but with three laps to go Clayton Brandwood and new rider Liz Leyden managed to move 300 metres ahead of the field. With a lap to go it looked as if they stood a good chance of retaining a lead but it wasn't to be and a fast moving bunch caught them as they turned the final bend. Clint still managed to latch on to the chasers and had sufficient strength to finish just behind Tim Mollison who again timed his finish to perfection. The newly retired (from work that is) Ian McFall celebrated by taking 3rd, while Sean

Crummey, Afton Galbraith and John Sonego filled the remaining cash-prize places out of the 25 riders who started the event.

'C' grade also had a largish field of 25 riders and while there were no heroics the pace proved fast and there were moments when groans of pain were heard from the ranks as they passed the judges' line. At the finish Wayne Lally bided his time, sat on the wheels of those leading out and easily came around with 30 metres to go to score a clear victory. Taking trial rides, Andrew Patterson and Karim Keshavjee appeared to enjoy their first ride with the club to finish 2nd and 3rd respectively while old-time sprinter Mick Russell was followed in by Dean Wright, Steve Rouse and the rest of a closely bunched field.

With a relatively small field of 13 riders 'D' grade was nevertheless run at a fast pace and while there were no heroics witnessed from the line the sprint saw strong riding from the sprinters in the bunch. At the end of their 30 minutes and 2 laps Clint Braidwood proved too strong for the opposition and probably looked 'promotion' in the eye when he crossed the line with 20metres to spare over 2nd placed Pat Briggs, with Doug Macdonald just shading out Dave Bebee, Dave Dellar and Bill Stibbs.

'E' grade was in no mood to take prisoners, with the result that the field split three-quarters of the way through the race, leaving Mick Dunne, Heather Sanderson, Megan McEwan and Brian Kennedy to fight out the finish. For the second week running, Mick Dunne proved too strong for his compatriots and finished a few metres ahead of Heather Sanderson, Megan McEwan and Brian Kennedy, with the remainder of the field riding comfortably to the finish.

9 January – Wangara

While I was sunning myself in Bali our intrepid President, Wayne Lally stepped into the breach to record the following two excellent reports:

What a way to start the first race of the new-year. At the sign-on table we had 104 riders line up down the street, including

over 50 wanting to pay annual memberships. We managed to get the first race going only 5 minutes late!

'A' grade had 34 starters and the quality field was out to prove a point. After 20 minutes there were 8 away, but by 40 minutes only 4 were still there. With the big bunch chasing hard at the bell only Ed Hollands and Chris Glasby were strong enough to make contact with the front four. Desperate sprinting saw Ed Hollands win from Brett Stapleton, Jon Gregg, Matt Upton, Matt Korten and Chris Glasby.

'B' Grade, with 25 starters, got away to a very fast pace that continued for the whole 45 minutes. Ever-consistent Ian McFall won the bunch sprint from Ian Trayler, Paul Dobson, Andrew Duff, Steve Farren and Paul Heyes.

'C' Grade's 24 starters, really livened up after 10 minutes and the lead bunch kept getting smaller and smaller each lap. At the finish only 3 were left. The sprint went easily to Andrew Patterson from Nick Cunnington and Simon Hood. Further back came Glenn French and Craig Saywell, then Lee Potthast.

'D' Grade, with 15 riders, saw strong man Scott Martin make several break-away attempts, but the consistent riding of the bunch brought him back. The final sprint placings went to Geoff Gilmore and Pat Briggs from Alison Dyson, Dave Dellar, Scott Martin and Wayne Gordon.

Our 'E' Grade set a good steady pace. Coming down to the final sprint, Len Hall showed a clean pair of wheels to Barry Eversden, Fran Watson, Des Williams, Helen Watkins and Denis Robinson.

Although many of our riders were in Adelaide for the Tour Down Under events we had 83 starters.

'A' grade really livened up when a new rider to our club by the name of Troy Coulthard broke away from the start.

Using his TT skills, Troy stayed away, with Paul Prottey in tow for the first 25 minutes. Eventually 4 strong riders caught these two and the six stayed away for a sprint finish. Ryan Suckling was first across the line just in front of Matt Korten, Matt Upton, Paul Prottey, Pedro Turibaka and Troy Coulthard.

'B' Grade had the largest bunch of the day and although there were many attempts to split the field, it still came down to a mass sprint. The strong men - Bruce McLennan, Adam Godwin and Tony Mott took the first three placings, followed by Rick Churchill, Andrew Patterson, Brett Clapham and the rest of the 25 starters.

'C' Grade had a nice sized group, including three ladies. Dean Wright showed the benefit of hard training to win from the consistent Nick Cunnington, Mick Russell and John Liso, followed by Rebecca Wheadon and Ross Powell.

'D' Grade, with just 11 riders who all worked well together. Doug Macdonald was first around the final corner but Greg Smith finished very fast to win by a length. Bill Stibbs was 3rd ahead of Wayne Gordon, Leon Nieuwenhuizen and Allan McDonald.

'E' Grade. Welshman Dai Sankey was soon into his regular TT mode and broke away early to win by 1½ minutes. Des Williams led the peleton home ahead of Barry Eversden, Fran Watson, Brian Kennedy and Alan Taylor.

23 Jan – Jim Thomson Memorial Criterium Points Score, Rockingham

Rather than being fried in the heat as we have done in previous years, this year's Jim Thompson Memorial turned out to be run in cool and pleasant conditions, under grey skies and with a hint of rain. First off the rank was 'E' grade who set a hot pace in the early laps, resulting in a break of three riders – Des Williams, Brian Kennedy and new member Sandy Hartland who kept together to contest the three sprints. Des Williams with two 1st places took the overall points win with a total of 12 points, which not only gave him the Jim Thompson trophy presented by the Shire

of Rockingham, but also the trophy in memory of Jim Campbell who sadly passed away during this race a few years ago. Sandy Holland showed great form in her first race with the club when taking out second while Brian Kennedy was third.

Other than the first sprint that went to Dave Berglund, 'A' grade with 18 riders turned into two events when Ian Lyne performed his usual act of breaking away early in the race. Joined by Sam Smith and Chris Brown the trio dominated the race when cleaning up all the major points. Sam, in taking the four remaining sprints gained 20 points, a score that not only saw him rewarded with the 'A' grade trophy and prize-money, but also the award for the best overall performance of the day. Chris Brown with 12 points was second and Ian Lyne with 8 points was third.

'B' grade was a much closer run event with the group of 11 riders staying together for the duration of the race. Scott Ayles proved best on the day when taking two sprints and recording a second and a third place to score 12 points. Reg Edwards who took the first and also the fifth and final sprint was close behind on 10 points, while Andrew Duff was third, another two points behind.

In 'C' grade, Lee Potthast took first honours when just beating comeback rider Colin Rose across the line, the two along with Wayne Lally dominating the day. Colin took the overall points score by one point on the final sprint when taking out third place for 2 points against Lee's fourth place and 1 point.

Wayne Gordon after taking 2nd place in the first 'D' grade sprint just behind Greg Smith, decided after the 2nd sprint in which he didn't feature, that there was scope to attack and stay away – a policy that paid off as he rode clear to take out the third and fourth sprints with the rest of the field far behind. Greg Smith in also taking out the second sprint gained enough points to launch him into 2nd place overall, while Bill Stibbs came third.

30 January, Criteriums, Wangara

With 81 riders the field was slightly down on previous weeks but that could be put down to the media warnings of doom associated with the cyclone bearing down the west coast. However, apart from a hot and humid start, the expected storms failed to eventuate, leaving the starters to compete in sticky conditions. Not that this stopped the action, especially in 'A' grade

where there was a great deal of cut and thrust among the 23 riders, with attack after attack. There were a few promising moves, the first a group of five moved off the front at about the 25 minute mark, but these were soon brought to bay. Ian Lyne tried an epic at the 35-minute mark to be joined soon after by Andrew Prosser and Ian Gregory. However, the effort saw the two chasers suffer and abandon, a fate that also hit Pedro Turibaka who featured prominently on quite a few occasions. With two to go, a promising attack saw Keith Winch and Phil Johnston take a 100metre lead, but their effort was in vain as they were brought back to the fold halfway through the final lap, leaving the finish to a mass bunch sprint. This went to Ryan Suckling who took his 2nd win in his short career with the club when leading in Dean Gathercole, Michael Tapscott, Ian Gregory, Dave Rawlings and Tim Mollison. The latter rider thus cemented the confidence that the handicapper had in his ability when promoting him from 'B' grade. There were lots of sagging knees among those who finished!

With 25 riders, 'B' grade saw the largest field of the day. There were few attacks in the early stages, the first of note being made by Gavin Lawson at the 15-minute mark. He was joined by Gerrit Coatzee on the next lap and when they returned to the shelter of the bunch it was the turn of Clayton Brandwood and Wal Crowley to have a go. This also turned out to be a short-term break but a solo effort by Chris Clarke with four laps to go looked as if it might succeed. However, it proved three-quarters of a lap too far and at the line it was the usual fight of the sprinters. There was only a wafer between the first two riders with the verdict going to Frans Buissink over Ian McFall after a close look at the camera. Tony Mott showed his usual good sprinting form when easing out Matt Davis, Ian Trayler and Paul Heyes, that group taking all the cash prizes.

With only 13 riders there was little chance of a serious attack, and all participants were keen to shut things down.

This kept the sprinters happy, especially Mark Stephens who crossed the line just ahead of John Liso, Peter Neuzerling and most of the bunch.

'D' grade's 15 riders kept a steady and at times pedestrian pace for most of the race, perhaps reflecting the humid and sweaty conditions. Megan McEwan tried a break in the final laps but no-one appeared keen to join and help her. As with 'C' it all came down to the final 300metres, with Doug Macdonald taking an easy looking lead as they came around the final bend to hold it to the line. Pat Briggs was some 10metres behind, followed by Allan MacDonald, Alison Dyson and refugee from the British weather, Welshman Dai Sankey happily soaking up the sun to obtain a tan. Unluckiest rider and only non-finisher was Greg Smith who suffered a puncture.

With only 5 'E' graders it was a race of attrition. With Des Williams finding the hot conditions a bit too uncomfortable it left the four survivors to fight it out. On the bell lap Dave Nangle and Michael Guerin joined forces to take a 50metre lead, with the former Scottish exile beating Michael across the line. Brian Kennedy fought it out for 3rd place with Denis Robinson who acknowledged defeat with 30 metres to go.

Another bright and comfortable morn made for perfect conditions, though a rival CA event saw starters down to a moderate 75 riders. In 'A' grade, the still respectable field of 14 riders saw some hard riding. What looked like a promising break occurred at the 20minute mark when George Miller and Ian Lyne took a lead of 50 metres, though that was soon negated and a lap later Roger Knight had a gap of 30 metres only to be replaced by Paul Lamond a lap after that. With half the field sitting up, a group of six moved away at the 40minute mark, never to be seen by the rest of the field and to finish ahead by some 50 seconds. Despite a valiant effort by George Miller, it was Richard Kelly who took first place on the line, with Tim Mollison, Greg Stoyles, Ian Lyne and Peter Shanley finishing close behind.

'B Grade's 22 starters didn't stand around, attack following attack, the first notable gap appearing when Stewart Durham took a 50 metre lead after about 10 minutes of riding. He was soon absorbed and after a few more attacks, Merv Byfield, Peter Mills and Ian Turner were prominent for a few laps while both Bob Addy and Brett Clapham briefly appeared off the front. Antony Bourn and Kevin McIllduff took what looked like a possible winning move at the 30-minute mark, only to be brought back towards the end of the race by the vigilant peleton. At the bell, Merv Byfield and Tony Mott led by 50 metres, and it was anyone's guess as to whether they could hold the lead. Came the final bend and they still had a slight gap that they managed to hold to the end, with Merv proving triumphant over Tony in the sprint and with Ian McFall leading in the chasers for third place. Sean Crummey, Ian Traylor and Ian Turner filled in the other cash places, with the rest of the group close behind.

'Chopper' Marshall looked as if he meant business in the opening laps of 'C' grade's race though with the initial sparkle removed the group got their act together to nullify any possible breaks. The result was a relatively fast but featureless race with

the action being confined to the final 300metres. Once more 'Chopper' sparkled to lead in Mark Burke by a length, followed closely by Mick Brown, Doug Macdonald, Alison Dyson and Javan Wollsoncroft.

With 11 starters in 'D' there were too few riders to allow anyone to creep away unknown to the bunch. With the verdict lying in the sprint, Annie Bramley showed her strength when beating renown sprinters Bill Stibbs and Allan MacDonald by a length. Leon Nieuwenhuizen broke a long line of 6th placings to finish fourth ahead of second placed female, Helen Cripps, and 6th placed Eddie Gillfillan.

'E' grade saw an evenly matched bunch jockey for positions as they completed their 25minutes and 2 laps. It proved to be one of Jack Iveson's 'good' days and he took a gamble that paid off when he started an early sprint that took him across the line ahead of Des Williams, with Leo Enright finishing third.

3 April, Criteriums, Wangara

In breezy but warm conditions the 115 riders completed an incident-free day.

A warning to 'A' grade that lapped riders would be pulled out seemed to enliven the end of the field to greater action than in the previous few weeks. Not surprising was the fighting spirit of George Miller who attacked from the gun only to be brought back after a lap or so at the front. At the 30-minute mark a group of eight opened up a gap of 300metres, though any thought of a smooth ride to the finish was thwarted through aggressive attacks from Pedro Turibaka and later in the race by Doug Stewart. The final decision came down to a fast and aggressive sprint where Wayde Keyser showed his prowess when beating Doug Stewart across the line by a good length, with John Gregg finishing third when edging out Pedro Turibaka and the remainder of the break consisting of Michael Tapscott, Ian Calverley, Scott Sanders and Fenton Moran. George Miller led in the chasing bunch some 40 seconds down.

'B' grade with 26 riders was also on fire during their 45 minutes and 2 laps of the circuit. Mick Brown was an early animator while Geoff Marshall also put light between himself and the bunch in the opening phase of the race. Martin Calley and Paul Hearne opened up a gap of 100

metres on lap 3 but all came together on the following lap. It remained quiet until the closing laps. Geoff once more tried to ride to glory with 5 laps to go but was brought back, leaving the way for Jorge Bottello to fight for glory with two laps to go. Jorge was joined by a flying Peter Mills and going into the bell lap they had a lead of some 70 metres but neither featured in the placings as they were caught before the finishing straight, when glory came to Karim Keshavjee in a well timed sprint that saw him just lead in Matt Wickstrom, Fred Zurita, Bruce McLellan, Paul Hearne and John Clark and the remainder of the closely packed field. Special praise to Paul Hearne who after his effort faced the 400km plus drive back to his home at Geraldton!

'C' grade saw a few attacks early in the race but none were of significance and predicatively it came down to a fast and furious sprint finish. First across the line was Glen French who had a wheel advantage over Peter Neuzerling, while Mick Russell was able to hold off Alison Dyson who took fourth place following her promotion from 'D'. Kelly Gray was second female home in 6th place, just one place behind Doug Macdonald who with another few points sealed his winning margin in the Roger Sutton criterium points competition.

The nine members of 'D' grade found little enthusiasm for a break in the breezy conditions, a situation that played into the hands of the sprinters led by Scott Martin who dominated the finish. Second place fell to Trevor Robson ahead of Allan MacDonald, Graham Benthien and Eddie Gillfillan.

'E' grade saw most of the usual peleton bar Jack Iveson and Leo Enright fight for points in the 'E' grade Sutton competition. Des Williams who had featured in earlier placings in the grade added a few more maximum points when he beat WA Senior Citizen of the Year, Brian Kennedy, across the line. Fran Watson was well pleased with her third place just ahead of Alan Taylor and remainder of the group.

10 April, Colin Rossiter Memorial Criteriums, Kewdale

A great way to finish off the criterium season and a turnout of 98 riders and a large group of spectators gave due homage

to the memory of our recent colleague Colin Rossiter who passed away in 2010. Colin who always starred on road and track would have been very pleased with the high standard of riding and gutsy efforts in all grades on what turned out to be a very blustery morning on the Kewdale circuit. In the absence of Anne Rossiter who was unfortunately unable to attend because of illness, daughter Kim did the honours at the presentation, where she thanked everyone for remembering her father and for the effort put in to make the day a success. In addition to generous prize-money, the winners of each division were presented with attractive blue silk sashes provided by Anne. 'E' grade winner Des Williams added his to a personal collection of sashes that was first started when he rode as an amateur at the Goodwood track in Adelaide in 1948-49 – Des was as good as a youngster as he is as an oldie! Of interest was Kim's presentation to the winner of 'C' grade, who just happened to be a close relation, Mike Rossiter, while others such as Mick Russell placed second in that group was a close associate of Colin over many years – both Colin and Mick being renown as ace sprinters in their day.

The morning was rounded off with a feast of bangers and onions following presentation of the Roger Sutton Memorial points competition (see below).

Just a quick rundown on the events: 'A' grade with 26 riders saw an early attack by Gary Wright that was a precursor of things to come, though the main split in the field came at about the 17-minute mark when Gary, Ian Lyne, Chris Glasby and Matt Poyner put on the pressure to open up a lead of about 400metres. With five laps to go, the quartet were joined by Martin Depiazzi and Ian Gregory who had worked hard for a number of laps in no-mans land, but this was the signal for Chris Glasby to try a lone break, except that the sprinters in the group gave no quarter resulting in him being brought back into the fold with two laps to go. However, an attack on the final lap saw Gary Wright come around the corner of the finishing straight with a lead

of about 30 metres that allowed him to hold a lead of about 10metres at the line. Matt Poyner bested the other sprinters when coming in second, ahead of Martin Depiazzi, and with Ian Lyne, not renown for his sprint, finishing in fourth place just ahead of Ian Gregory and Chris Glasby who had obviously given his all in his attempted break. Behind, Eddie Hollands made a lone chase over the final few laps to finish a clear 7th while Tim Mollison also did an epic to finish a lone eighth.

'B' grade, 45mins plus 2 laps

This turned out to be a fast and furious race, Brett Clapham and Bob Addy starting the action with attacks in the early laps. Brett moved back to the pack but Bob was still there along with John Clark and Tony Mott with a lead of 150metres at the 17-minute mark, only for Bob, suffering from a cold, deciding that discretion was the better part of valour when he handed in his number a couple of laps later. The lead of the surviving duo came to an end just one lap later when new member and old time star Gary Suckling along with Paul Dobson not only caught the break but opened up a lead of 100metres. Joined at the 35-minute mark by a strong-riding Sean Crummey it looked to everyone that the fate of the race had been sealed but the unusual sight of even the sitters-in joining in the chase changed that picture, with the break being absorbed with three laps to go. It was a nail-biting time for spectators as they watched the final corner for a mass attack, but that was to discount the strength of Bruce McLellan who cornered with a comfortable lead that allowed him to comfortably coast up the straight with 10 metres to spare on the line. Stewart Passmore who had also been aggressive during the race was rewarded with winning the bunch sprint while Gary Suckling also had his due reward for effort when he finished on his wheel to take third. Andrew Duff held up the honour of Churchill Cycles when finishing fourth, while Brett Clapham, Steve Milford and most of the rest of the 24 survivors finished close behind.

'C' grade, 35 minutes plus 2 laps

While the 26 riders in 'C' grade finished together, this belied the many attacks that came from the field, the most adventurous being that of Ian Broadley who opened up a gap of over 100metres on the third lap. With large pay packets in the offing, such breaks were watched carefully, forcing the sprinters to join in the chase, but damage to their twitch muscles wasn't sufficient to damage their limbs, and as they approached the line the familiar efforts of the sprinters became obvious to the judges and by-standers alike. As earlier mentioned, first place went to Donneybrook's Mike Rossiter, when he just beat Mick Russell across the line. The consistent Peter Neuzerling was third, followed by the lanky figure of Todd Ryan. Steve Rouse was also in the contest alongside Sutton points' winner Doug Macdonald and first lady on the day, Alison Dyson.

'D' grade, 30 minutes plus 2 laps

As with 'C' grade, the 14 'D's', no doubt inspired by the prize-money on offer, were far from complacent, resulting in the field being split time and time again. Gerry Allen, just back from one of his fishing research trips to Indonesia soon found that his two training rides in a month was insufficient preparation and wisely packed before the half-way mark. Wayne Gordon in his first ride in a couple of months also found himself in arrears but joined Helen Peniston to finish the race. Once again, the finishing laps were packed in favour of the sprinters resulting in Bill Stibbs kicking ahead of Pat Briggs, Allan MacDonald, Eddie Gillfillan, and Trevor Robson at the front end of the field.

'E' grade, 25mins plus 2 laps

Although the bunch was stretched at times, most members of the grade seemed happy to wait until the final 300 metres, not surprising in a field that consisted of mainly sprinters rather than breakaway merchants. Following recent triumphs, Des Williams again proved to be the supremo when beating a valiant effort by Jack Iveson to best him at the line. Alan Taylor finished in glory in the eyes of his family

supporters, while Leo Enright finished close behind to take fourth place.
